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# STATE ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION

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### **Issue:** California Federal Fiscal Year 2016 Grant Funding Update

The Coalition for Juvenile Justice (CJJ) is a nationwide coalition of State Advisory Groups (SAGs) and allies dedicated to preventing children and youth from becoming involved in the courts and upholding the highest standards of care when youth are charged with wrongdoing and enter the justice system. The National Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Coalition (NJJJPC) is a collaborative array of youth- and family-serving, social justice, law enforcement, corrections, and faith-based organizations, working to ensure healthy families, build strong communities and improve public safety by promoting fair and effective policies, practices and programs for youth involved or at risk of becoming involved in the juvenile and criminal justice systems. Act 4 Juvenile Justice (ACT4JJ) is a workgroup of the NJJPC.

Each year, CJJ and ACT4JJ publish an overview of federal juvenile justice grant funding by state at <http://juvjustice.org/114th-congress> and <http://act4jj.org/federal-funding/funding-states>. The information currently listed at those sites is for FFY 2015. The enclosed California Federal Fiscal Year 2016 Grant Funding Update was submitted to Senior Policy Associate Naomi Smoot at CJJ using the existing template for states. It included the Title II Formula and Local Assistance Grants, Reducing Racial and Ethnic Disparities (R.E.D.) Grant, Title II Tribal Youth Grant, Juvenile Accountability Block Grant (JABG), and Title V.

Although the BSCC no longer receives Title V and JABG allocations, Naomi Smoot requested that we include several examples of programs that were previously funded by them in order to show the value of those funding streams. None of the Title V programs remain in operation. JABG funding was zeroed out in the federal budget beginning in FFY 2014. The listed programs were funded by JABG carryover dollars from prior years. The only JABG project currently funded is the Evidence Based Practices Training Project, which is funded through June 2016. At the March 16, 2016 meeting, SACJJD voted to use the final \$190,000 in remaining JABG funds to extend this project through March 1, 2017.

Lists of the local grant projects currently funded by Title II (Local and Tribal), R.E.D., and JABG are included in your packets.
