Project Title	Brea Police Department Integrated Crime Center
Proposal Summary	The incidence of retail theft-related crime, motor vehicle theft, and cargo theft are on the rise in the City of Brea. Because of this problem, the City of Brea, in partnership with the Brea Police Department, seeks to create an Integrated Crime Center which can be used as both an investigative tool to solve reported crimes, and also a real-time incident monitoring center. The project involves many components including software, office space, Video Management and Storage, Automated License Plate Reader Cameras, and Unmanned Aircraft Systems. The goal of the project is to reduce the prevalence of these types of crimes.

Project Need

The City of Brea (Brea) has a significant and vibrant retail business footprint with more than 2.5 million total square feet of retail space; over 400 retail businesses including major retailers such as Nordstrom, Macy's, Home Depot, Target, and Walmart; \$2.4 billion in total sales; and sales tax revenues of \$24 million for the 21/22 fiscal year of which 27.6% represents retail sales tax specifically. One prominent retail shopping center, Brea Mall, is the only Super Regional Mall within a 20-mile radius and a premier shopping destination to residents of Orange County, the Inland Empire, and Greater Los Angeles. Brea Mall consists of 74 acres, approximately 1.2 million square feet of retail space, four major retail anchors, including one of the top performing Nordstrom Stores in Southern California and in the Country, and more than 175 specialty stores and restaurants. The Brea Mall's retail, restaurant, and auto sales alone account for 30% of the City's overall sales tax revenues. In May, the Brea City Council approved The Brea Mall Mixed-Use Project, which is scheduled for completion in 2026 and includes plans to re-develop a

15.5-acre segment of the total mall property into retail and restaurant space, and a multi-story 380-unit apartment complex.

There are three California state highways in Brea: the 57 freeway (SR-57), Imperial Highway (SR-90) and Carbon Canyon Road/Valencia (SR-142), all of which are major thoroughfares that provide easy access into and out of Brea, for residents and visitors alike. Unfortunately, the easy access these state highways provide to Brea also allow for potential criminal offenders to quickly enter and exit our city.

Brea's popular retail shopping centers attract many shoppers, diners, and enthusiasts from throughout the Southern California region. However, these hubs of social activity also attract criminals, specifically organized retail theft crews and auto thieves. From 2022 to the first quarter of 2023, retail theft-related crimes represented over 21% of the total crimes committed in Brea. Similarly, robberies in Brea are concerning, with 64% of all robberies related to retail crimes. Retail store robberies, burglaries, and thefts jumped from 368 in 2021 to 638 in 2022. Motor vehicle theft has continued to rise, up 60% in the same period. Theft of vehicle parts, specifically catalytic converters, rose 21% in 2022.

In April 2023 robberies increased a discouraging 180%, with 36% of those robberies occurring at the Brea Mall.

Retail theft, motor vehicle and motor vehicle part theft, and to a certain extent cargo theft, primarily from delivery vehicles or from the front of the homes of residents, are a serious concern for the Brea community. These incidents create significant financial losses for businesses and individuals, both residents and visitors. These crimes have consequences not just for the victims, but also for the entire Brea community.

Retail theft erodes consumer confidence, creating decreased traffic for retail establishments, decreased economic activity, and potential job losses. Motor vehicle and motor vehicle part thefts leave victims without a means of transportation and create a sense of insecurity and fear. Cargo thefts, although not as pervasive, still have a damaging impact on the commercial business community and the sense of security residents have at their homes.

These crimes have an overall negative influence on the public safety and economic vitality of the entire community. It is not just the reality of these crimes and their immediate impact on the community. Just as critical is the perception of public safety these crimes create. The perception of crime can have an exponentially damaging impact on a community and its members. Likewise, such perception is a deterrent to both potential customers and people or organizations seeking to make Brea the home of their businesses.

The Brea Police Department (Department) is committed to proactive community and problem-solving policing but is continually searching for more effective resources to enhance that proactivity for the benefit of the entire community. Crime prevention, however effective, can always be improved through creativity and innovation.

The proposed Integrated Crime Center (ICC) will focus on the full range of organized retail theft, motor vehicle and motor vehicle part theft, and cargo theft. The ICC will be a vital resource not just for the Department, but also for agencies in the region who would benefit from the use of investigative leads that the ICC would generate. The net result of the implementation of the ICC will be enhanced situational awareness, improved collaboration among regional law enforcement partners, and more aggressive proactive crime prevention strategies.

Establishing and marketing the ICC will generate a greater sense of security and public safety, thereby attracting more retail businesses, visitors, and investors which will ultimately support the continued and vital economic growth and vitality of Brea. The benefits for Brea and the surrounding communities that will accrue from approving this grant far surpass and extend the initial costs for the ICC. The Brea City Council is fully supportive of establishing the ICC and is committed to providing continuing funding far beyond the end of the grant period.

The Department has embarked on a public information campaign, engaging community members, including historically underrepresented community members, through Town Hall meetings and social media messaging. Further, various state and federal elected officials have indicated their strong support for the ICC.

The Department solicited input and feedback from community members through City Council meetings, a formal survey process, and a number of community outreach events. Overall, the Department received positive feedback from the Brea Community. Twice the number of individuals expressed their appreciation and/or support for the project when compared to the number of individuals who expressed any concerns. From the concerns raised, the Department identified several areas of focus including privacy rights, placement of cameras, costs, and transparency. These concerns warrant a response; therefore, the Department is committed to implementing guiding principles to govern the ethical and responsible use of technology. These issues are addressed within other sections of the grant narratives.

Project Description The Department will create an Integrated Crime Center (ICC) designed to adjust to anticipated and continually evolving changes in technology. The ICC will be focused on providing real-time, actionable intelligence to responding officers for in-progress just-occurred crimes. The ICC will provide a comprehensive source of information that will empower the Department to more effectively investigate and solve crimes that might otherwise go unsolved because of a lack of investigative leads.

To perform multiple functions simultaneously, the ICC will include a

software program to integrate diverse elements including video feeds, call information, automated license plate reader (ALPR) scans, locations of police resources, and drone footage. The software from the proposed vendor will seamlessly integrate with existing Department applications (e.g., CAD/RMS, BWC, etc.), also provided by the vendor.

The ICC will gather video feeds already streaming from more than 200 traffic cameras located at intersections across Brea as well as video feeds from over 100 City-owned cameras located in parks and facilities that currently feed into other video management systems. All these video feeds will be incorporated into a Video Management System (VMS) platform.

The VMS will record and retain the video feeds for approximately 30 days to enable the Department to gather evidence and intelligence including suspect vehicle descriptions, license plates, and directions of travel. The VMS will enable a Crime Analyst dedicated to the ICC to real-time track suspects and suspect vehicles as they flee from a crime scene. The anticipated result will be an increase in apprehensions and recovery of stolen property. The software will be able to detect unusual patterns of activity from live video feeds, mitigating or eliminating the necessity for staff for constant video monitoring.

The Department has had extensive communication with staff from Brea Public Works, Brea Information Technology Department, and Brea's contracted traffic signal engineers to discuss feeding video camera footage from 47 City intersections into the ICC. There are 21 intersections with video cameras that are currently configured to transmit video feeds into the ICC. The remaining 26 intersections with video cameras will have encoding equipment installed and configured to allow video feeds to be transmitted to the ICC.

The 200 traffic cameras that would initially feed into the ICC are currently used to detect vehicles and phase traffic signals. They have a fixed view and transmit a lower-resolution video feed. To augment these, this project will include the use of the existing dormant fiber to construct a high-speed communication network that will interface with the installation of high-resolution multi-sensor cameras with a 360-degree field of view at 43 signal-controlled intersections and pan-tilt-zoom cameras at 14 key intersections.

Fixed position ALPR cameras will be installed at most major entry and egress points in the city to scan vehicles and license plates, providing valuable investigative information to identify suspects and suspect vehicles. The ALPRs will feed into software to provide realtime alerts about specific vehicles, e.g., identified suspect vehicles and stolen or wanted vehicles. Scans are also a rich source of investigative leads.

The Department anticipates installing fixed position ALPR cameras at

14 locations in the city during the first year of the grant. As part of this ICC project, the Department will lease two (2) portable ALPR cameras that can be moved easily and placed into specific locations as needed and appropriate.

The Department will upgrade its portable surveillance technology with portable surveillance cameras that will be deployed to target areas. These cameras will be able to double as ALPR cameras and can communicate license plate scans in the same manner as the specifically designed ALPR cameras.

The grant funding will support a two-phase drone program that will provide video feeds that can be incorporated into the ICC. First phase drones will initially be used for crime scene documentation and reconstruction, aid in major traffic collision investigation, assist officers with critical incident management, and to monitor special events. The first-year cost of the drone program will include in-house pilot training for up to ten (10) drone pilots, the necessary software licensing and setup/configuration, and the required Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Certificate of Approval.

During the second year of the drone program, it will expand to include dedicated pilots and training, larger aircraft, and fixed landing pads. The drones will be automatically dispatched to calls for rapid arrival at scenes and to provide real-time critical preliminary intelligence, enabling more effective and safer incident and resource management. The software associated with the drones will allow video footage from the drones to be live-streamed, recorded, and retained in the Video Management System.

There will be staffing costs associated with the ICC. The technology components of the ICC will dramatically increase the demands on the Information Technology (IT) Division. Therefore, the grant funding will immediately add a full-time IT Specialist position in the Department with responsibility for implementing the ICC, but concurrently responsible for maintaining all other Department hardware and software.

The Department will staff the ICC with a full-time Crime Analyst, with staffing focused on times of the day and days of the week with the most police-related activity. The Crime Analyst will monitor information sources received by the ICC and perform real-time monitoring of areas of concern, e.g., infrastructure, high crime areas, and special events. The Crime Analyst will review and gather real-time information for active calls and crimes in progress. The Crime Analyst will review information gathered by the ICC, such as stored video feeds and license plate scans, to identify evidence of crimes that have occurred. Lastly, the Crime Analyst will perform all data collection and evaluation efforts including the development of the Local Evaluation Plan and Final Local Evaluation Report.

The final anticipated staffing requirement in the second year of the grant funding will be the addition of a full-time Police Officer, to allow

for appointment of one Police Officer as the Drone Pilot. By using a Police Officer in this position, the pilot can use his/her field experience and expertise to interpret real-time incoming information, provide relevant information to responding officers, and more effectively manage responding resources.

The target areas for this project will be critically and objectively evaluated based upon identified crime patterns and areas of high crime activity. The evaluation process will not be static as crime patterns and areas of high crime activity continually morph. Instead, the evaluation process will be dynamic, designed to rapidly evolve and respond to changes in crime patterns and areas of high crime activity.

The evaluation process will include not only objective crime statistical analysis, but just as importantly input from Department staff and a full spectrum of community members including historically under-represented and under-served community members and community retailers large and small who are especially impacted by retail thefts. Input and feedback from those stakeholders will be constantly and thoughtfully sought.

The benefits of this ICC project will not be limited to the Brea community. The Department is committed to coordinating and collaborating with other regional law enforcement agencies with information sharing activities on crime patterns, criminal activities, and identified offenders to enhance the public safety of the entire area. Criminal activities and offenders do not recognize arbitrary jurisdictional boundaries which makes information sharing so critical.

The Department anticipates that information gathered by the ICC may have a positive impact on successful apprehensions and prosecutions of offenders with enhanced suspect and suspect vehicle identification techniques and improved objective evidence gathering through surveillance videos.

As reasonable, appropriate, and legally permissible, the Department may share some of the information gathered by the ICC with non-law enforcement entities including community organizations and community retailers. This information sharing will be focused on crime prevention education.

The project's goals, objectives, and impact are described in the completed Project Work Plan included as an Attachment.

The Department is committed to the ethical and responsible use of technology. Therefore, the Department intends to use technology in ways that are proper, fair, purposeful, meaningful, ethical, and unbiased, and not to exceed what is necessary to achieve legitimate and specific law enforcement objectives. For example, the Department will not place City-owned cameras in private spaces and will avoid recording in areas where and when there is a reasonable expectation of privacy. To this end, working with the California Police Chief's Association's Technology committee, the Department will aid in the development and implementation of these guiding principles to govern the use of this technology, including key transparency objectives.

The data gathered from technology resources will be protected by using powerful internal cybersecurity measures and by using vendors, systems, and products that adhere to strict and robust data protection and cybersecurity standards and protocols.

The Department has implemented and strictly enforces the following policies related to surveillance technology, securing any data collected or stored, and racial biased policing:

606.2 POLICY Unmanned aerial systems may be utilized to enhance the Brea Police Department's mission of protecting lives and property when other means and resources are not available or are less effective. Any use of a UAS will be in strict accordance with constitutional and privacy rights and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations.

429.2 POLICY The policy of the Brea Police Department is to utilize ALPR technology to capture and store digital license plate data and images while recognizing the established privacy rights of the public. All data and images gathered by the ALPR are for the official use of this department. Because such data may contain confidential information, it is not open to public review.

806.2 POLICY Members of the Brea Police Department will adhere to all applicable laws, orders, regulations, use agreements and training related to the access, use, dissemination, and release of protected information.

401.2 POLICY The Department is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of this department to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group.

Project Organizational Capacity and Coordination The technology components of the ICC will dramatically increase the demands on the Information Technology (IT) Division. Therefore, the grant funding will add a full-time IT Specialist position in the Department with responsibility for implementing the ICC.

The ICC will be staffed with one full-time Crime Analyst. This position will monitor information received by the ICC and perform real-time monitoring of areas of concern; review and gather real-time information for active calls and crimes in progress and review information gathered to identify evidence of crimes that have occurred; collect and evaluate data; and develop the Local Evaluation Plan and Final Local Evaluation Report. The Department will recruit candidates for the IT Specialist and Crime Analyst positions. Those positions will demand specifically defined qualifications for hiring and will receive intensive initial and ongoing relevant and appropriate training.

The final anticipated staffing requirement during the second year of the grant will be the addition of a full-time Police Officer to the Department's sworn personnel. The Department will then recruit and appoint one Police Officer as the Drone Pilot. By using a Police Officer as the pilot, they can use their field experience and expertise to interpret real-time incoming information, provide relevant information to responding officers, and more effectively manage responding resources. By virtue of the requirement to use field experience and expertise, the Drone Pilot will be selected from the existing workforce.

To ensure the project is implemented as intended, project management and oversight will be provided by a department supervisor selected by the Chief of Police. The selected supervisor will demonstrate relevant knowledge of the involved technology systems. The selected supervisor will regularly communicate regarding the progress of the project with the contract vendor(s), and the involved City staff.

The internal partners involved in the implementation of the ICC include the Brea City Council and City administration, whose approval is necessary for acceptance of the grant funding; Police Administration to track the grant funds; Public Works to address incorporating existing City-owned cameras into the ICC system; and the Information Technology Division to work with the Department's IT Specialist to implement the necessary software.

The external partners involved in the implementation of the ICC include the City's contracted traffic engineers to address incorporating the existing traffic control cameras into the ICC system and the Orange County District Attorney's Office.

Motorola will be a significant partner as the proposed vendor for providing the essential software program to integrate all the diverse information gathering elements in the ICC system, expanding the VMS and the video storage servers, and expanding and improving the capabilities of the existing 200 traffic cameras. Avigilon will be a partner by providing cameras at intersections throughout the city. Another external partner will be Vigilant to provide fixed and portable ALPR cameras and supporting software. Security Lines will be an external partner responsible for providing portable covert surveillance cameras. The final external vendor partner will be CAPE that will provide Motorola drone products.

The external vendor partners have already been proposed and will be selected within the parameters of the City's purchasing policy. As such, the Department is ready to initiate the ICC project as soon as grant funds are accepted. However, the Department remains committed to continually evaluating the project and as necessary revising the proposed equipment, hardware, and software to ensure that the equipment, hardware, and software are consistent with rapidly evolving contemporary standards.

The management structure and the decision-making process for the ICC project are based upon the Department's administrative structure. Immediate responsibility for the project will be assigned to a department supervisor selected by the Chief of Police. That selected supervisor will demonstrate reasonable knowledge of the technology that will be involved in implementing the ICC. Final responsibility for the project will remain with the Chief of Police.

The current Brea City Council and City administration are committed to continue funding the project and potentially expanding the project in the future.

Project Evaluation and Monitoring

The ICC is a long-term, technological project. By utilizing grant funding, the Department is investing in a foundation for the technological infrastructure that will last for decades to come. As such, the ICC project will be monitored and evaluated for its effectiveness on a regular basis throughout the life of the grant funded project. The project will be objectively evaluated for its effectiveness in achieving the goals and objectives detailed in the Project Work Plan. If the project is not effective in achieving those goals and objectives, the Department is willing and able to change equipment, hardware, or software as appropriate. The ultimate commitment of the Department is to the success of the project in enhancing and maintaining public safety in the community.

Monitoring activities and the evaluation process will be facilitated by regularly scheduled Department staff meetings including involved patrol officers, investigators, civilian staff, field supervisors, Department administrative staff, the ICC IT Specialist, and the ICC Crime Analyst. The external contract vendor partners involved in the project may be incorporated into the evaluation process if there are issues regarding the effectiveness of equipment, hardware, or software. The Department will also regularly solicit input on the effectiveness of the project from external stakeholders in the community including historically under-represented and underserved community members and large and small retailers.

Some of the project evaluation process will include qualitative analysis, e.g., community member and large and small retailer perceptions of the safety in the community. The Department has existing technology in place to gather and evaluate feedback on employee interactions during calls for service. This same technology can be expanded upon for qualitative analysis relevant to the ICC. Quantitative analysis will be based upon objective crime statistics and investigation clearance rates data. That quantitative data will be collected by the Crime Analyst assigned to the ICC project, comparing baseline data established before the project was implemented and subsequent data collected after the project was implemented.

The methodology that will provide a quantitative data assessment of whether the project achieved the desired outcomes is quite simple and objective. Attempting to determine the quantitative data related to crimes that may have been prevented by the ICC project is extremely problematic and unreliable. However, an impact on crime statistics and an improvement in investigation clearance and apprehension rates associated with retail thefts, motor vehicle and motor vehicle part thefts, and cargo thefts are easily quantifiable for an objective assessment of the ICC project. Budget Instructions Applicants are required to submit a Proposal Budget and Budget Narrative (Budget Attachment). Upon submission the Budget Attachment will become Section 5: Budget (Budget Tables & Narrative) making up part of the official proposal. Bias-Based Policing

401.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidance to department members that affirms the Brea Police Department's commitment to policing that is fair and objective.

Nothing in this policy prohibits the use of specified characteristics in law enforcement activities designed to strengthen the department's relationship with its diverse communities (e.g., cultural and ethnicity awareness training, youth programs, community group outreach, partnerships).

401.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

Bias-based policing - An inappropriate reliance on actual or perceived characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age, cultural group, disability, or affiliation with any non-criminal group (protected characteristics) as the basis for providing differing law enforcement service or enforcement (Penal Code § 13519.4).

401.2 POLICY

The Brea Police Department is committed to providing law enforcement services to the community with due regard for the racial, cultural or other differences of those served. It is the policy of this department to provide law enforcement services and to enforce the law equally, fairly, objectively and without discrimination toward any individual or group.

401.3 BIAS-BASED POLICING PROHIBITED

Bias-based policing is strictly prohibited.

However, nothing in this policy is intended to prohibit an officer from considering protected characteristics in combination with credible, timely and distinct information connecting a person or people of a specific characteristic to a specific unlawful incident, or to specific unlawful incidents, specific criminal patterns or specific schemes.

401.3.1 CALIFORNIA RELIGIOUS FREEDOM ACT

Members shall not collect information from a person based on religious belief, practice, affiliation, national origin or ethnicity unless permitted under state or federal law (Government Code § 8310.3).

Members shall not assist federal government authorities (Government Code § 8310.3):

- (a) In compiling personal information about a person's religious belief, practice, affiliation, national origin or ethnicity.
- (b) By investigating, enforcing or assisting with the investigation or enforcement of any requirement that a person register with the federal government based on religious belief, practice, or affiliation, or national origin or ethnicity.

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401.4 MEMBER RESPONSIBILITIES

Every member of this department shall perform his/her duties in a fair and objective manner and is responsible for promptly reporting any suspected or known instances of bias-based policing to a supervisor. Members should, when reasonable to do so, intervene to prevent any biased-based actions by another member.

401.4.1 REASON FOR CONTACT

Officers contacting a person shall be prepared to articulate sufficient reason for the contact, independent of the protected characteristics of the individual.

To the extent that written documentation would otherwise be completed (e.g., arrest report, field interview (FI) card), the involved officer should include those facts giving rise to the contact, as applicable.

Except for required data-collection forms or methods, nothing in this policy shall require any officer to document a contact that would not otherwise require reporting.

401.4.2 REPORTING OF STOPS

On or before January 1, 2022, the Department is required to begin collecting data on all stops conducted by peace officers within the Department. Commencing on or before April 1, 2023, the Department is required to annually report to the California Attorney General data on all stops conducted by peace officers within the Department during the preceding calendar year (Government Code§ 12525.5).

401.5 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

Supervisors should monitor those individuals under their command for compliance with this policy and shall handle any alleged or observed violations in accordance with the Personnel Complaints Policy.

- (a) Supervisors should discuss any issues with the involved officer and his/her supervisor in a timely manner.
 - 1. Supervisors should document these discussions, in the prescribed manner.
- (b) Supervisors may periodically review MAV recordings, portable audio recordings, Mobile Digital Computer (MDC) data and any other available resource used to document contact between officers and the public to ensure compliance with the policy.
 - (a) Supervisors shall document these periodic reviews.
 - (b) Recordings or data that capture a potential instance of bias-based policing shall be appropriately retained for administrative investigation purposes.
- (c) Supervisors shall initiate investigations of any actual or alleged violations of this policy.
- (d) Supervisors should take prompt and reasonable steps to address any retaliatory action taken against any member of this department who discloses information concerning bias-based policing.

401.6 REPORTING TO CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

The Professional Standards Unit Manager shall ensure that all data required by the California Department of Justice (DOJ) regarding complaints of racial bias against officers is collected and provided to the Records Supervisor for required reporting to the DOJ (Penal Code § 13012; Penal Code § 13020). See the Records Bureau Policy.

Supervisors should ensure that data stop reports are provided to the Records Supervisor for required annual reporting to the DOJ (Government Code § 12525.5) (See Records Bureau Policy).

401.7 ADMINISTRATION

Each year, the Operations Division Commander shall review with the Training Coordinator that all officers are in compliance with bias-based policing training. In addition, a review will be conducted with the Professional Standards Lieutenant of all citizen complaints from the previous year for any violations or concerns of bias-based policing. A memo will be submitted to the Chief of Police outlining any public concerns, complaints or identified training issues for consideration of changes in training or operations to improve service to the community.

401.8 TRAINING

Training on fair and objective policing and review of this policy should be conducted as directed by the Professional Standards Unit.

- (a) All sworn members of this department will be scheduled to attend Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST)-approved training on the subject of bias-based policing.
- (b) Pending participation in such POST-approved training and at all times, all members of this department are encouraged to familiarize themselves with and consider racial and cultural differences among members of this community.
- (c) Each sworn member of this department who received initial bias-based policing training will thereafter be required to complete an approved refresher course every five years, or sooner if deemed necessary, in order to keep current with changing racial, identity and cultural trends (Penal Code § 13519.4(i)).

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPRs)

429.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidance for the capture, storage and use of digital data obtained through the use of Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) technology.

429.2 POLICY

The policy of the Brea Police Department is to utilize ALPR technology to capture and store digital license plate data and images while recognizing the established privacy rights of the public.

All data and images gathered by the ALPR are for the official use of this department. Because such data may contain confidential information, it is not open to public review.

429.3 ADMINISTRATION

The ALPR technology, also known as License Plate Recognition (LPR), allows for the automated detection of license plates. It is used by the Brea Police Department to convert data associated with vehicle license plates for official law enforcement purposes, including identifying stolen or wanted vehicles, stolen license plates and missing persons. It may also be used to gather information related to active warrants, homeland security, electronic surveillance, suspect interdiction and stolen property recovery.

All installation and maintenance of ALPR equipment, as well as ALPR data retention and access, shall be managed by the Support Services Division Commander. The Support Services Division Commander will assign members under his/her command to administer the day-to-day operation of the ALPR equipment and data.

429.3.1 ALPR ADMINISTRATOR

The Support Services Division Commander shall be responsible for developing guidelines and procedures to comply with the requirements of Civil Code § 1798.90.5 et seq. This includes, but is not limited to (Civil Code § 1798.90.51; Civil Code § 1798.90.53):

- (a) A description of the job title or other designation of the members and independent contractors who are authorized to use or access the ALPR system or to collect ALPR information.
- (b) Training requirements for authorized users.
- (c) A description of how the ALPR system will be monitored to ensure the security of the information and compliance with applicable privacy laws.
- (d) Procedures for system operators to maintain records of access in compliance with Civil Code § 1798.90.52.
- (e) The title and name of the current designee in overseeing the ALPR operation.
- (f) Working with the Custodian of Records on the retention and destruction of ALPR data.

(g) Ensuring this policy and related procedures are conspicuously posted on the department's website.

429.4 OPERATIONS

Use of an ALPR is restricted to the purposes outlined below. Department members shall not use, or allow others to use the equipment or database records for any unauthorized purpose (Civil Code § 1798.90.51; Civil Code § 1798.90.53).

- (a) An ALPR shall only be used for official law enforcement business.
- (b) An ALPR may be used in conjunction with any routine patrol operation or criminal investigation. Reasonable suspicion or probable cause is not required before using an ALPR.
- (c) While an ALPR may be used to canvass license plates around any crime scene, particular consideration should be given to using ALPR-equipped cars to canvass areas around homicides, shootings and other major incidents. Partial license plates reported during major crimes should be entered into the ALPR system in an attempt to identify suspect vehicles.
- (d) No member of this department shall operate ALPR equipment or access ALPR data without first completing department-approved training.
- (e) No ALPR operator may access department, state or federal data unless otherwise authorized to do so.
- (f) If practicable, the officer should verify an ALPR response through the California Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (CLETS) before taking enforcement action that is based solely on an ALPR alert.

429.5 DATA COLLECTION AND RETENTION

The Support Services Division Commander is responsible for ensuring systems and processes are in place for the proper collection and retention of ALPR data. Data will be transferred from vehicles to the designated storage in accordance with department procedures.

All ALPR data downloaded to the server should be stored for a minimum of one year (Government Code § 34090.6) and in accordance with the established records retention schedule. Thereafter, ALPR data should be purged unless it has become, or it is reasonable to believe it will become, evidence in a criminal or civil action or is subject to a discovery request or other lawful action to produce records. In those circumstances the applicable data should be downloaded from the server onto portable media and booked into evidence.

429.6 ACCOUNTABILITY

All data will be closely safeguarded and protected by both procedural and technological means. The Brea Police Department will observe the following safeguards regarding access to and use of stored data (Civil Code § 1798.90.51; Civil Code § 1798.90.53):

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPRs)

- (a) All ALPR data downloaded to the mobile workstation and in storage shall be accessible only through a login/password-protected system capable of documenting all access of information by name, date and time (Civil Code § 1798.90.52).
- (b) Members approved to access ALPR data under these guidelines are permitted to access the data for legitimate law enforcement purposes only, such as when the data relate to a specific criminal investigation or department-related civil or administrative action.
- (c) ALPR system audits should be conducted on a regular basis.

For security or data breaches, see the Records Release and Maintenance Policy.

429.7 RELEASING ALPR DATA

The ALPR data may be shared only with other law enforcement or prosecutorial agencies for official law enforcement purposes or as otherwise permitted by law, using the following procedures:

- (a) The agency makes a written request for the ALPR data that includes:
 - 1. The name of the agency.
 - 2. The name of the person requesting.
 - 3. The intended purpose of obtaining the information.
- (b) The request is reviewed by the Support Services Division Commander or the authorized designee and approved before the request is fulfilled.
- (c) The approved request is retained on file.

Requests for ALPR data by non-law enforcement or non-prosecutorial agencies will be processed as provided in the Records Maintenance and Release Policy (Civil Code § 1798.90.55).

429.8 TRAINING

The Brea Police Department should ensure that sworn and non-sworn members receive department-approved training for those authorized to use or access the ALPR system (Civil Code § 1798.90.51; Civil Code § 1798.90.53).

Unmanned Aerial System

606.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to establish guidelines for the use of an unmanned aerial system (UAS) and for the storage, retrieval and dissemination of images and data captured by the UAS.

606.1.1 DEFINITIONS

Definitions related to this policy include:

Unmanned aerial system (UAS) - An unmanned aircraft of any type that is capable of sustaining directed flight, whether preprogrammed or remotely controlled (commonly referred to as an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV)), and all of the supporting or attached systems designed for gathering information through imaging, recording or any other means.

606.2 POLICY

Unmanned aerial systems may be utilized to enhance the department's mission of protecting lives and property when other means and resources are not available or are less effective. Any use of a UAS will be in strict accordance with constitutional and privacy rights and Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations.

606.3 PRIVACY

The use of the UAS potentially involves privacy considerations. Absent a warrant or exigent circumstances, operators and observers shall not intentionally record or transmit images of any location where a person would have a reasonable expectation of privacy (e.g., residence, yard, enclosure). Operators and observers shall take reasonable precautions to avoid inadvertently recording or transmitting images of areas where there is a reasonable expectation of privacy. Reasonable precautions can include, for example, deactivating or turning imaging devices away from such areas or persons during UAS operations.

606.4 PROGRAM COORDINATOR

The Chief of Police will appoint a program coordinator who will be responsible for the management of the UAS program. The program coordinator will ensure that policies and procedures conform to current laws, regulations, and best practices and will have the following additional responsibilities:

- Coordinating the FAA Certificate of Waiver or Authorization (COA) application process and ensuring that the COA is current, and/or coordinating compliance with FAA Part 107 Remote Pilot Certificate, as appropriate for department operations.
- Ensuring that all authorized operators and required observers have completed all required FAA and department-approved training in the operation, applicable laws, policies, and procedures regarding use of the UAS.
- Developing uniform protocol for submission and evaluation of requests to deploy a UAS, including urgent requests made during ongoing or emerging incidents.

Unmanned Aerial System

Deployment of a UAS shall require written authorization of the Chief of Police or the authorized designee, depending on the type of mission.

- Coordinating the completion of the FAA Emergency Operation Request Form in emergency situations, as applicable (e.g., natural disasters, search and rescue, emergency situations to safeguard human life).
- Developing protocol for conducting criminal investigations involving a UAS, including documentation of time spent monitoring a subject.
- Implementing a system for public notification of UAS deployment.
- Developing an operational protocol governing the deployment and operation of a UAS including but not limited to safety oversight, use of visual observers, establishment of lost link procedures, and secure communication with air traffic control facilities.
- Developing a protocol for fully documenting all missions.
- Developing a UAS inspection, maintenance, and record-keeping protocol to ensure continuing airworthiness of a UAS, up to and including its overhaul or life limits.
- Developing protocols to ensure that all data intended to be used as evidence are accessed, maintained, stored, and retrieved in a manner that ensures its integrity as evidence, including strict adherence to chain of custody requirements. Electronic trails, including encryption, authenticity certificates, and date and time stamping, shall be used as appropriate to preserve individual rights and to ensure the authenticity and maintenance of a secure evidentiary chain of custody.
- Developing protocols that ensure retention and purge periods are maintained in accordance with established records retention schedules.
- Facilitating law enforcement access to images and data captured by the UAS.
- Recommending program enhancements, particularly regarding safety and information security.
- Ensuring that established protocols are followed by monitoring and providing periodic reports on the program to the Chief of Police.
- Maintaining familiarity with FAA regulatory standards, state laws and regulations, and local ordinances regarding the operations of a UAS.

606.5 USE OF UAS

Only authorized operators who have completed the required training shall be permitted to operate the UAS.

Use of vision enhancement technology (e.g., thermal and other imaging equipment not generally available to the public) is permissible in viewing areas only where there is no protectable privacy interest or when in compliance with a search warrant or court order. In all other instances, legal counsel should be consulted.

UAS operations should only be conducted consistent with FAA regulations.

606.6 PROHIBITED USE

The UAS video surveillance equipment shall not be used:

- To conduct random surveillance activities.
- To target a person based solely on actual or perceived characteristics, such as race, ethnicity, national origin, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age, cultural group, or disability.
- To harass, intimidate, or discriminate against any individual or group.
- To conduct personal business of any type.

The UAS shall not be weaponized.

606.7 RETENTION OF UAS DATA

Data collected by the UAS shall be retained as provided in the established records retention schedule.
