A "Federal Promise Zone" is any area with a continuous boundary and a population of not more than 200,000 that is nominated by a local government or Indian tribe and designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to receive priority for federal funding on the basis of its unemployment, poverty, vacancy, and crime rates. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of a California Promise Zone.
