The bill would allow a county or county agency to contract for personal services currently or customarily performed by employees, as applicable, when specified conditions are met. Among other things, the bill would require the county to clearly demonstrate that the proposed contract will result in actual overall costs savings to the county and to show that the contract does not cause the displacement of county workers.</p> | <p>This bill would impact how counties can subcontract.</p> <p>BSCC’s grant administration flexibility would be reduced.</p> | <p>9/5/17 Read second time and amended; re-referred to Senate Committee on Rules.</p> |

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| AB 2250 Children of incarcerated parents: working group. | Assembly Member Thurmond (D-15) | Amended 4/5/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/fares/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180AB2250 | This bill would require the BSCC to convene a working group regarding the specified needs of children of incarcerated parents. The working group would include representatives from the CDCR, the Judicial Council, CPOC, and children of incarcerated parents and their advocacy groups. The working group would develop guidelines for policy and procedure decisions and make policy and fiscal recommendations to the Legislature for potential revisions to state law. | The BSCC would convene a workgroup that develops a Legislative report by January 1, 2020. | 5/25/18 In Assembly Appropriations: Held under submission. |

Grants would be awarded to communities that meet specified requirements, including a population of 30,000 or less and have 25% or more of their census tracts with lower median household incomes or areas disproportionately affected by environmental pollution or other hazards. | BSCC would be required to administer the grant program. | 5/25/18 In Assembly Appropriations: Held under submission. |

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| AB 2866 Cannabis regulation. | Assembly Member Cooper (D-9) | Amended 4/19/18 https://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180AB2866 | <p>This bill would generate additional Prop 64* related funds in two ways: (1) This bill would make a violation of the advertisements and marketing provision requirement (adding a licensee’s license number to advertisements) by a cannabis-related business using a fictitious license number subject to a civil penalty of \$10,000 per incident. This bill would continuously appropriate the funds from these civil penalties to the BSCC. (2) This bill would, in addition to any other penalty, if the controlled substance is cannabis that is being sold or distributed in violation of state or local law, require that any excessive profits, as defined, obtained from the use of a building, room, space, or enclosure in violation of the above specified law, be subject to seizure. The bill would appropriate the seized funds to the BSCC.</p> <p>*California Proposition 64, the California Marijuana Legalization Initiative, was on the November 8, 2016, ballot and was approved. 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| <p>SB 635 Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development: Office of the Promise Zone Coordinator</p> | <p>Senator Hueso (D-40)</p> | <p>Amended 1/23/18 https://leginfo.ca.gov/faces/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB635</p> | <p>This bill would establish within the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development the Office of the Promise Zone Coordinator to provide state assistance to federal Promise Zones within California. A "Federal Promise Zone" is any area with a continuous boundary and a population of not more than 200,000 that is nominated by a local government or Indian tribe and designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development to receive priority for federal funding on the basis of its unemployment, poverty, vacancy, and crime rates. "California Promise Zone" means a California community that has been designated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development as a Promise Zone. The BSCC would be required to, for all its programs, provide preference or priority points to entities, projects, or both, located within or for the benefit of a California Promise Zone.</p> | <p>BSCC would be required to work with the Promise Zone Coordinator for its RFP processes. The bill would require the Board to report to the Legislature on the effectiveness of the program.</p> | <p>BSCC would be required to administer this competitive grant program.</p> | <p>5/25/18 May 25 hearing: Senate Appropriations: Held under submission.</p> |

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| <p>SB 1106 Young adults: deferred entry of judgment pilot program.</p> | <p>Senator Hill (D-13)</p> | <p>Amended 4/9/18 http://leginfo.ca.gov/fares/billNavClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB1106</p> | <p>Existing law authorizes, only until January 1, 2020, the Counties of Alameda, Butte, Napa, Nevada, and Santa Clara to establish a pilot program to operate a deferred entry of judgment pilot program for eligible defendants. This bill would extend the operative date of the authorization to establish a pilot program in those counties to January 1, 2022. The bill would also expand the scope of the program to include the County of Ventura. This bill would also require the board to submit the comprehensive report to the Assembly and Senate Committees on Public Safety no later than December 31, 2020.</p> | <p>Adds due date for BSCC to submit a Legislative Report no later than 12/31/20.</p> | <p>5/3/2018 Referred to Assembly Public Safety.</p> |
