The bill would also require the board to make this data available on the board's Internet Web site on a quarterly basis.</p>	<p>BSCC would be required to collect and analyze recidivism data and post the data on its website.</p>	<p>2/28/17 – Set for hearing in Assembly Committee on Public Safety</p>

This bill further states: "Nothing in this chapter prohibits or restricts any government entity or official from sending to, or receiving from, federal immigration authorities, information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of an individual pursuant to Sections 1373 and 1644 of Title 8 of the United States Code."</p> <p><b>This bill has an urgency clause.</b></p>	<p>May impact California's eligibility for Federal grant awards.</p>	<p>1/31/17 Passed Senate Public Safety with a 5/2 vote and referred to Senate Appropriations</p>

If the county elects to participate, the chief probation officer of each county would be required to create a program, licensed by the Department of Social Services. The pilot projects established by this measure would be contingent upon an appropriation in the annual Budget Act.</p>	<p>BSCC would administer the pilot program.</p>	<p>Referred to Assembly Committees on Public Safety and Human Services</p>
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
