BSCC OVERVIEW

- Reports directly to the Governor's Office
- Organized under the Governor appointed Board made up 13-Members.
- Three main responsibilities:
 - Inspections of local facilities (jails)
 - Training requirements for local officers.
 - Grants to local governments, community organizations, tribes BS

BSCC DIVISIONS

- Corrections Planning and Grant Programs (CPGP)
- Facilities Standards and Operations (FSO)
- Standards and Training for Corrections (STC)
- County Facilities Construction (CFC)
- Administrative including Research and Information Technology

MMIP FUNDING

- Established in 2022 by the California Legislature as the result of tribal advocacy efforts.
- Competitive grant to federally recognized Indian tribes in California.
- To fund a wide range of activities, depending on the need of the tribe.
- Total Funding Available: \$11.4 million



MMIP FUNDS CAN BE USED FOR:

- Culturally based outreach and awareness campaigns
- Mental health services and substance use disorder treatment
- Reunification of indigenous foster youth/runaways with their families
- Community healing activities
- Activities to prevent human trafficking
- Services for the families of missing or murdered indigenous people
- Promoting coordination between tribal police and non-tribal police
- Legal clinics that offer training on the development of formal agreements between tribes and state and local governments
- Funding partnerships with local law enforcement agencies
- ...or something not listed here that is needed by a tribal community



MMIP FUNDING CONT.

- Awarded \$2.8 million to 3 tribes
 - October 1, 2023 June 1, 2028
- State Budget Act of 2023
 - \$12 million additional
- RFP release November 2023
 - \$19.9 million still available
 - Expanded outreach
